
On Performance Space Issues: "Legendary is a bit crammed. Too much people, too small a stage."— Background dancer

¥500 FOR AN AFTERNOON

OF MTG? Some Constructive Suggestions from a MTG Enthusuast

Student Submission

On April 4th, the Magic: The Gathering Club will host its latest tournament, but with a shocking price tag -- ¥500. This is a significant jump from the usual fee around ¥300, leaving many members, including myself, wondering why.

After confirming with the venue owner, the actual cost per participant (including venue, cards, etc.) is \(\frac{1}{3}\)50—a fair and consistent price. However, an additional \(\frac{1}{4}\)100 "charity tax" has been imposed, turning the event into an involuntary fundraiser. While I fully support charity, donations should be voluntary and based on donor intent, not mandatory fees tacked onto an existing event with an already a pricey base fee. The community of MTG players should at least be informed and given a choice, as \(\frac{1}{4}\)100 is in no ways a small sum of money. Furthermore, fundraisers should contribute meaningfully to the event rather than simply sticking a "charity" tag and inflating prices. A more respectable approach would be optional QR code donations, as done in the past for theatre performances.

Additionally, the tournament's pricing has steadily increased from \$300 to \$500, and students deserve transparency on where their money goes in the future. With the base cost already high at \$350, the ethical choice would be to make charity contributions optional rather than adding to the financial burden.

Anonymous Student Council Member's Takes on Solving School Bureacracy

I magine that you want to throw a party at our school. Who should you go to for approval? Or, if you want to publish a newspaper. Who should you go to, and for how long do you need to wait? These questions are all unanswered at BINJ. We lack a clear, defined process for student affairs and inquiries. Currently, to propose or ask for something, a student must go all around the school, asking different people and being referred to someone else.

I propose that our school forms a committee of executives who are authorized to make decisions. If students want the school's assistance or approval, they can submit a request to the committee, who will respond within a reasonable time frame (e.g. 48 hours) with a preliminary response, along with what (if any) needs to be modified in the request. This way, it will be easier for students to organize events, suggest improvements, and submit general inquiries about school policies, etc.
